Upper School

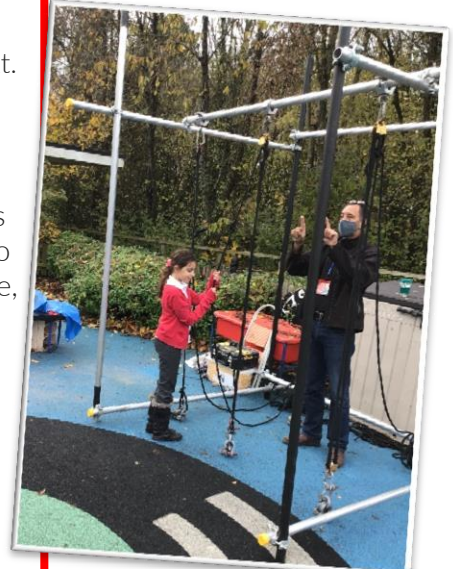
This week, we welcomed Phil Tickle to school. He was AMAZING! His real life job is a rigger in the entertainment industry came to talk to the children about what his job involves as well as linking his work succinctly to our Science objectives this term. Phil has many years of experience in the industry having worked on numerous television shows such as Dancing on Ice, alongside the accolade of the Head Rigger and Production Manager for the John Peel Stage at the Glastonbury Festival.

After listening to Phil describe what he does (building giant Meccano and Lego kits as he described it to the children!) and many WOW moments at the very tall structures that he builds, climbs and works on, the children were treated to a demonstration on pulleys which linked nicely to our DT objectives this term.

Answering the children's questions about how he gets the heavy equipment up high, the children were given the opportunity to find out for themselves by trying the different pulleys. They had to use their knowledge of fractions to think carefully about how the same weight felt easier to pull the more ropes were involved.

The children were clearly very enthused by the afternoon activities and we may even have a budding rigger or two in our midst (especially when they saw how high you got to climb and the big machines you got to be in charge of!).

Our thanks go to Phil, who took the time to come and tell us about a job that many people many not be aware of but is just as important as the people who stand at the front of the stage!
