Meet Fudge!

We have been exploring the idea of a school dog for quite a while now and Mrs Holdich's puppy cockapoo, Fudge, fits our ticklist perfectly! School dogs are becoming a more common occurrence and schools that have dogs report huge benefits for the whole school community.

Used as reading dogs, emotional regulation and calming dogs as well as interpreting Makaton signs and supporting children with specific learning needs, dogs can be trained in a number of ways to bring their calming, kind influence to bear with children and adults. We are not entering into this lightly and would really like your views on us having Fudge in school so we'd really appreciate you taking 5 mins of your time to complete this survey please: SCHOOL DOG NEWSLETTER

We are working with a company called 'Canine Assisted Learning' who are specialists at introducing dogs into schools and ensuring schools, and their stakeholders understand a dog's needs, how they best interact with children and will be on hand every step of the way to support us in making Fudge accessible and safe for children with allergies, those with phobias and how best to manage Fudge in school safely for the benefit of all involved. I look forward to hearing your views.



As children begin to return to school on 8th March, we know that they will be coming back having experienced all sorts of different home learning styles during this lockdown. We know that we will have 20 children in each of our younger classes and 30 in the older ones, all at different places in their learning and possible gaps and different stages of learning behaviours.

Never fear!

Our staffing ratios have been kept high so that the pupil:adult ratio means children have ready and speedy access to an adult – this is a proven strategy with high success rates in catch up. Essentially, we are in the same situation that we were in in September. We have purposefully chosen a strategy of having experienced teachers in post which paid off in the autumn term and will now. We will do informal assessments with all children, just as we did in September so we know exactly what learning they've retained and where there are gaps.

We have a very practical week planned for the w/b 8th March so that children can settle back into routines.

Our focus in the first few weeks will be reading with children on a 1:1 basis, getting them engrossed in a new topic, lots of short bursts of play so that they can engage with friends again who I know they've all missed and a heavy focus on PSHE so that we can deal with the rollercoaster of emotions all children will be experiencing.

Parents evenings after Easter holidays will be a good time to catch up with how your child is doing in school.

Playing & gathering

We know that the thing most children have found most challenging this lockdown is not seeing their friends. Whether they've been in school or been at home, friendships that were rekindled in the autumn term have been sorely missed.

We also know how tempting it will be to arrange playdates and 'meet ups' in the park. We're hearing that an awful lot of that is going on now!

I must ask you as parents to please refrain from these gatherings as much as possible please until things settle down a little more – we are still under national restrictions and working really hard to maintain bubbles in school.




We should all still be in the situation that children are being dropped off at school and collected with the same respect to social distancing and immediately going home as we should have been adhering to in the last weeks and months.
