Climate change for our children's future

You can't possibly have missed the press coverage of the COP26 conference and the pledges being made to our children (and us) about how leaders will protect their future. What can be done with what is taken down?

I am sure that the children will guide us further and hold us to account for our choices but we are keen to really live the changes required to secure our children's future.

COVID cases PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

We have had several children off school this week with COVID, having caught it over the holidays. This feels an inevitable part of life at the moment but it's left families feeling a little at sea as to what to do and what to expect. thought it would be helpful to outline the basics:

- If your child has a +ve PCR, they need to isolate.
- Your wider household do not need to isolate but I would recommend you undertake regular (daily?) free LFT tests as a precaution.
- Your child will need to isolate for 10 days from the onset of symptoms OR, if asymptomatic, from the date of the +ve PCR test.
- If your child is off with COVID, we will NOT be setting Google classroom work as they are poorly. *However*, families have been in touch to say their child has only been poorly for a couple of days and is then fine (& bored). If this does happen to you, please let us know and we will begin to set work for them on Google classroom. The least they miss of school, the better!

My advice about LFT testing daily is simply that – just advice but it has picked up positive siblings that would otherwise have been in school. If your child is unusually lethargic, has sickness, diarrhea or the common COVID symptoms, please PCR test to be on the safe side.

e-safety learning

This half term began with our new whole school E-safety focus of **Online Relationships**. Children across the school had opportunities to think about how well they know people and if they know people that they communicate with online as well as they do people that they speak to face to face.

Our youngest children learnt about different ways that you can communicate online and shared times that they have done this. The children in years 2 and 3 thought about the concept of trust, what that means and who you can or should trust in different situations.

The older children took this a step further and learnt about ways of being responsible online and trustworthy, particularly when sharing images.

It's been bonfire crazy in Sprat & Winkle this week as the children have been exploring firework patterns and poetry about this special time of year. Their topic this term is 'Fire' and I know there are plans afoot for them to each learn how to use the fire steel in forest school and create fires of their own

Spelling

I'm sure you'll be aware that spellings are changing at Stockbridge. We have slowly launched our new spelling scheme over the last 6 weeks so that the teachers have time to find out the best ways of working it with our children given COVID gaps and we've begun the scheme proper this week.

For children in Year R & Year 1, they will continue with their daily phonics lessons and learn spelling through these.

For children in Years 2-6, we will begin being 'spellbound' by spellings using our new scheme. Every fortnight, your child will be learning a new spelling rule or pattern. They will be challenged by a hypothesis about a spelling rule, for example, 'words ending in '-le' always have a double consonant' – they'll be asked to decide whether they think this is true, false or sometimes true and then set out to investigate and prove their thinking.

They won't be practicing this rule at home or having spelling tests. Instead, we'll be teaching spellings EVERY DAY. This means a hot focus on spellings all of the time – they really do matter.

At home, we would just like them to practice their 'focus five' – these are 5 spellings either from their year group list of words they have misspelled or, from their common misspellings in their day to day work. We do have a few super spellers who rarely make mistakes so we'll be taking more challenging vocabulary linked to their topic to challenge these children too.
