Allergies in school

We have a number of children with allergies in school to:

Raw milk

Raw egg

Whilst most of these are allergens only through ingestion,

chocolate, tomatoes & peanuts

on people's breath after they've eaten them can cause some of our children to have an anaphylactic shock.

Please DO NOT send in these things in lunchboxes or for snack. Snack time is a particularly tricky time as children eat snack whilst at playtime when they are roaming the playground.

Thanks for your help on this one. We know it may prove a challenge finding things for lunchboxes and snacks but fruit or veg are always good items to send.

Traffic and parking update

Last night, Governors, parents & Old London Road residents joined me at the Parish Council meeting to represent the school & our neighbours during the public questions/comments section in order to, yet again, raise the issues of safety on the way to school with the focus being on making Old London Road a one way road.

The Council have secured a £95k grant from Test Valley Borough Council for works to be done but had to find £10.5k to undertake a HCC feasibility study who will explore and propose measures to make Old London Road safer.

The meeting last night was to secure the funding for this feasibility study and I am delighted that the Parish Council voted in favour of this. It does NOT mean a one way street is agreed but it is one step closer to there being a solution. There were others at the meeting who have lived here & been involved with the school for over 30 years and they said they were talking about it even then!!

I also had a very productive meeting with our new Hampshire County Councillor, David Drew, yesterday who has promised to follow up on the other safety measures which were promised pre-COVID.

The learning pit

In assemblies this term, we are continuing our discovery about the learning pit – if you talk to your child about it, they should be able to explain that the pit is the place you can end up when learning is tricky or when you're learning something new.

Before Christmas, we talked about how it can be exciting to learn something new but you can feel overwhelmed and like it's too hard.

We learnt about how to start getting out of the pit by using all our collaboration skills. We are now focusing being resourceful and how this will help us get out of the pit.

We can be resourceful by:

- Using what we already know
- Picturing it in your head
- Using physical resources around you
- Looking for patterns and links

Music in school

After speaking with Kev this week, we would like to **postpone** the Guitar concert for a few weeks so that children can master their new pieces alongside some of the more Christmassy tunes they had planned to play.

Phonics

Children in our school learn to spell initially by learning phonics; this means teaching them that each of the 44 sound in the English language has a way of being written (did you know there are over 120 ways to spell the 44 sounds from the 26 letters of the alphabet – no wonder it's confusing!!).

To help children make the correct sound and remember them, we teach them actions to go with the sounds. We use actions based on speech and language therapy called 'cued articulation'. It teaches children where the sound is produced in their mouth.

You might think this sounds strange but, in a recent test with some of our Year 3 & 4 children, every single child spelt 'think' incorrectly. They put 'f' instead of 'th'!! This error comes from incorrect speech.

To help parents, especially those with children in years R, 1 & 2 with the actions, we have published some videos of the sound and the action together. The videos are organized into the 'sets' that children learn in school, in the order they learn them.
