We talk to the children all of the time about our planet; they've developed their own response to the climate challenge and are often intrigued when learning about new religions or countries or times in history.

Events of the last few weeks have shown how interconnected we are and made our world a little smaller. From Storm Eunice and the devastation that caused both in our own community and farther afield, to the desperate events in the Ukraine, the importance of collaboration and resilience has never been so close to home.

We were overwhelmed with the generosity from so many this week for our Ukranian collection - a great example of positivity and collaboration. Many thanks to Sarah Dunn and her team of willing helpers in collecting and shifting it all to a collection point.

The children have taken an active part in class assemblies on the conflict so that they could share their knowledge, thoughts, worries and questions at an age appropriate level. They have turned it into something positive by making postcards and leaflets of love and hope to send to refugees along with the donations received yesterday. We're also contributing to the Houghton group of donations with our messages in the hope that it may offer a small glimmer of sunshine for some.

The children have themselves come up with some ideas of how they could help support children in and fleeing from Ukraine which the school council will lead on in future weeks. Our future is in our children's hands and I am proud of our children's empathy and response this week.

How to talk to your child about conflict

Our response, as adults, to these events is what will form the bedrock of our children's opinions of, and response to, this conflict. Often unwittingly and unconsciously we are sending out messages in the conversations had about war, invasion, Russians, Ukranians, Europeans – these will all be reflected back in the talk on the playground and will either appease children's worries or fuel them. Some helpful hints below are intended as a guide and a prompt to help your child, no matter what age, to make sense of the war.

Like many other headteachers and teachers out there, we've been looking at each other's ideas for how to talk to our children about conflict and I thought the following 'nuggets' of information might help as the conflict deepens. They are courtesy of @dr.martha.psychologist who you might have heard on BBC London news. I have copied her posts here as they very much fit with the THRIVE approach we take in school and are helpful ways to align with your children's curiosities.

When children ask questions about the War what they are really asking is:

"Can you listen?"
"Is how I feel ok?"
"Am I safe?"

Children need you to listen

Dive in with your curiousity. Spend more time listening than talking.

- "This question is important. Tell
- "Where did you hear about that?""What do you think that means?"

Remember:

You do not need to have all the answers. Offering your child a safe space to have their emotions and fears contained is enough.

Children need to know how they feel is ok

Allow space for your child's feelings and share yours too if it feels safe to do so. This is validating to your child

Just some of the books we're using to support children's understanding:

- My name's not refugee
- The arrival
- Who are refugees & migrants?
 What made them leave their home?
- The day war came
- Here I am
- Tomorrow

Children need to know they are safe

Remind your child of their safety in the 'here & now' and help them focus on how you keep them safe

- "You are safe. I am here"

 "Where we live is very far away
- from the war. Want to see on a map?"
- "So many countries and people are working hard to end the war"

Things to do:

- Look at a map together be factual, what is happening?
- Read a news article from First News or listen to Newsround (TOGETHER) so that you can help them understand what they're hearing.
- Look for good news too we love 'The Happy Newspaper'

Safeguarding

Our e-safety learning in school is robust and rigorous and delivered frequently - always done on the first Monday after any half term so that children have at least 6 full sessions of e-safety as a 'drip feed' throughout the year. They also revisit it each week in their four weekly cycle of early morning lessons so that habits are slowly and gradually formed. Our aim is this teaching is never to scare the children but to make them aware of the pitfalls of online working and, most importantly, how to avoid them. Here's a helpful guide to social media apps your child may be keen to access.

Reading books

Mrs Cooper and I spent the majority of Tuesday's INSET day undertaking an overhaul of our reading books and are still completing this. Children in lower school and Sprat & Winkle will NOT be having books this weekend. We are still finalizing the new system and will be training staff in it early next week with the aim of every child in lower school & Sprat & Winkle having a book by Wednesday.

There will be a parent information session for all children in Years R. 1 & 2 this term, date will be announced in the next newsletter.

Most social media apps are 13+ (WhatsApp is 16+) but, as we are aware some children use them regularly, we wanted to share some important settings you might want to check to keep children safe online.

In other news...

COVID update

As I'm sure you are all aware, COVID rules changed on 22 February in England which will have an impact for all of us.

This is our current arrangements, in line with the COVID regulations nationally:

- We will not be wearing face masks in school unless a visitor or member of staff chooses to. When meeting with this person, we will adopt face masks if they would like us to
- Our staff have all agreed to maintain a regular testing regime for now. This means twice weekly tests.
- We are following the advice for anyone with symptoms of COVID to remain at home until these symptoms have passed and they feel well again before returning to school; this applies to staff as well as children.
- If your child is displaying signs of COVID, we will be calling you and asking you to pick them up immediately.
- Although it is no longer a legal requirement to stay at home if you have COVID, if you insist on bringing your child to pre-school or school when they have symptoms, we may take the decision to refuse your child attending, if, in our reasonable judgement, they would be putting others in the setting at risk. We ask therefore that you take a sensible decision that avoids a conflict, and keep your child at home until they are well enough to return to school.

Of course, we will keep up our hygiene routines, ventilation, sanitization and other protective measures and hope that we have no more outbreaks!
