Safeguarding

Have you heard of 'swiggle'?



This is a child-friendly search engine which we're encouraging children to use when searching for things in school. This is suitable for children in years 3-6. The reason it's suitable for children is that it's ad-free so there's no possibility of inappropriate content popping up anywhere.

Music

This month we've got a new musician to focus on, it's



We all know at least one or two of his songs and they're catchy, aren't they? We'll be using his music to help the children focus on tempo – this is how fast (or slow!) the music goes.



Reading

In school, we listen to children read throughout the week during guided reading sessions but what do these entail?

SPRAT & WINKLE & YEAR 1

Children have guided reading as a year group. Each class have a focus author which helps broaden the children's knowledge and access to rich texts which may be outside their individual reading level.

In addition, they are heard read at least twice per week by an adult in school.

LOWER SCHOOL – Years 2 & 3

In lower school, children work in small groups, with children of similar reading ability and have a text that it unique to that group. They read with an adult in this way 6 times over a fortnight. On the days they're not reading with an adult, they complete a comprehension task based on the text they're reading so that we can check how much they are independently understanding of what they read.

UPPER SCHOOL - Years 4-6

In the older year groups, we generally have one text which is a 'class read' and chip away at it chapters at a time. We might paraphrase some if it's a particularly chunky text! We also use mixed media with film as well as audio clips of the book, children may read it but also may listen to their teacher read to them and will always be learning new comprehension skills.

We unpick:

Why the author uses particular language What the overriding themes are of the text What impact it has on the reader

What we can tell about a character, setting or plot through inference (when the answer isn't immediately clear)
