Pre-school start and finish times

A reminder to everyone Pre-school start time is 9am. Any child arriving after this time would need to call the school office if arriving late to ensure lunches are ordered. Any absences are recorded for safeguarding purposes.

Clothes

Please ensure your child has named clothes in Pre-School. With the warmer weather coming children often need to remove layers as the day warms up and items get misplaced or lost if not labelled.

All children should have spare clothes in their bags as we do get messy sometimes, or accidents can happen. Children do not always recognize their belongings and this can be very time consuming for us and frustrating for parents when items go missing.

Where possible children need shoes they can manage themselves. We change shoes for active bodies, dressing up, as well as wellies for some activities. Children are encouraged to do these self-help skills themselves. If extra time is given they can manage very well. Practice makes perfect!

Phonic sound S

Early Years Foundation stage curriculum (EYFS)

Whilst it may look like we spend a lot of our time playing, the children are in fact learning and developing as part of an Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) curriculum – this is not because we are led and managed by the school – any pre-school should work under the EYFS curriculum and plan children's learning based on what they can do and what their next steps are.

We work hard to ensure children are developing and meeting the milestones needed to reach their full potential. As part of this we work closely with both Mrs Cooper, (Sprat and Winkle Teacher) as well as other outside teachers from other schools and professionals to best meet the needs of each individual child. One thing many parents want to focus on is school readiness; I prefer to call these, life skills. We don't just learn to do these things for school but to be independent and self-sufficient learners.

Over the coming weeks I will add regular entries to class dojo for you to reflect on how these skills may be being achieved for your child, and what this may look like. I will share with you our top 10 Skills to be achieved by the time children transition from pre-school to school. Whilst Covid may have impacted on some gaps in learning and social skills we collectively can work together as parents and professionals to ensure we set our children up ready to reach these life skills and help them be independent learners in future school years.

A YouGov report recently found:

- 98% of teachers report children are starting school unable to listen/respond to instructions.
- 86% of teachers report children who are not able to sit and eat independently.
- 54% of teachers report less than half their class start with basic number skills, counting recognizing numbers, what comes next, can we make new numbers if we put two groups together?

Class Dojo

The children really enjoy sharing their photos and parent added entries with their friends. They can use these to talk about experiences and special times encouraging language skills and friendship bonds. Keep them coming, they are great!
