Sun cream

Despite the rain, the sun is low in the sky in spring and catches us out by lunchtime with its strong rays.

A letter will be coming home requesting permission to re-apply cream at lunchtime. This is provided by pre-school as part of your consumables charge.

ALL children should arrive with cream already applied by yourself at home. As you can imagine it is a time consuming task applying sun cream to 10, 15, 20 children and for this reason we ask you to apply before arriving enabling us to be able to get stuck into other educational activities. Please do not be offended if you are asked to apply if forgotten. We are protecting and keeping your children safe and healthy.

Literacy in the Early years

The early years is an important time in building literacy skills for under 5's. Ways we encourage these fundamental skills are:

- Talking and sharing conversations and discussions, explaining actions, labelling encourage language
- Reading stories, listening to language, encouraging children to contributing to the story, what do you think is going to happening now and next? Why do you think that?
- Recognising print in the environment around them, labels, name cards, logos and more
- Children make up their own stories using puppets in the puppet theatre creating a beginning, middle and end. At this stage it looks very simple but the foundations of story thoughts and creations. E.g., One day there was a crocodile he went swimming and ate a boat. Children have opportunities to retell familiar stories such as Gingerbread man and Gruffalo. Stories with repetition are great for helping to build literacy skills such as the three little pigs.

We are having a focus and literacy boost in preschool reading books and noticing rhymes as part of our group activities. We would like to encourage these activities at home and would love to hear about them on Class Dojo. Children love to share what's happened at home with friends and this is fab for encouraging language and conversational skills with both us and their peers.

"The literacy experiences that children have before they start school form powerful brain connections. These connections are used for language, thinking and understanding. Without activities like talking, singing, reading, rhyming, scribbling and drawing, the brain doesn't develop these important connections"
